

Seeing Slavery.

A Collaborative Project with Ely Cathedral and The Clewer Initiative.

A series of 3 fully resourced humanities lessons exploring the links between the refugee experience and modern slavery.

History: Is slavery a part of our history?

A lesson that compares different forms of slavery throughout history, helping students to discover where, why and how it is very much a part of modern life.

Geography: Why do people risk so much?

A lesson that explore the experiences of refugees today, their journeys and the reasons why they undertake them.

Religious Studies: Who is my neighbour?

A lesson exploring Christian attitudes towards human rights and supporting those who seek refuge.

Schools are also invited to join us live, via the Ely Cathedral YouTube channel, at 0930 on 18th October 2021 for an assembly focused on anti-slavery day. This will be followed by the release of a film entitled “Sanctuary” which explores the role of Ely as a place of refuge during the Norman conquest. An opportunity for Key Stage 3 students to develop their own initiative to support unseen members of their communities.

Project Brief: One of the key reasons why refugees may find themselves at risk of exploitation is because they are too often unseen members of our communities. Slavery and exploitation thrives when it is unnoticed and unseen, it lives in the shadows. To prevent slavery and exploitation we need to see it, to shine a light on it and to see the people who are at risk from it. Your challenge is to find a way to make sure that all members of your community are seen, heard, included and welcomed.

The winning project will receive an additional £200 funding for their project.
